General notes

There haven't been any great changes lately and fortunately there are no seriously ill children at the moment, although there are always some children we have to worry about. For instance James who has needed no fewer than five blood transfusions within one year because of his sickle-cell anaemia.

New residents

At the beginning of January we welcomed 2 new residents: Sara and Solomon, both from Kumasi Children's Home.

Sara is about 7/8 and Solomon about 3/4 years old.

Both show mental health disabilities and signs from the autistic spectrum. They are beginning to feel at home in PCC.

2016 in retrospect

We would like to share some special and positive recollections of 2016 with you:

Improvement Daycare

In the course of 2016 we have succeeded in improving the programme for our Daycare groups considerably, we couldn't have done without the expert input of our extern, Marian.

As a result there is more fun, extra positive energy amongst the caregivers and a greater variety in interactive appliances.

And smaller groups: there are even 3 Daycare groups instead of 2 now.

Progressive development in physio

In 2015 physio had already reached a higher level thanks to the arrival, input and one hundred per cent commitment of "our" physiotherapist Inge. In 2016 we saw a boost in a further improvement in the quality and an increase in the motivation of our caregivers involved, also thanks to Inge and her colleague Ingrid.

It makes us all very proud of our PCC physio!

New generator and emergency power supply

At the beginning of 2016 a new generator arrived in PCC, which was installed under the supervision of our Dutch HIH board member Paul Lamberts. Our old generator (bought second hand) had reached the age of 50 (!) and we sincerely hope that our new generator will serve our Community for the same period of time. Our new generator works (if need be) satisfactorily, which makes us very happy.

Paul has also installed an intricate and useful emergency power supply in and about the big kitchen that will work when there is neither electricity nor a generator (continuously) working e.g. at night. This will also bring down expenses.

4 new washing machines

The bigger PCC becomes the more residents and laundry. Clearly we are very pleased with the 4 new and robust washing machines we were able to purchase thanks to a generous donation at the end of 2016 and the beginning of 2017. All stains disappear like snow in Africa!



New Info DVD about PCC

At the end of 2016 a wonderful and very informative new Info DVD about PCC was released thanks to our moviemakers Martin and Corinne.

It is often difficult to explain to others what it exactly is that makes PCC special; according to us this impressing DVD will do the job.

In 2016 a start was made with the support of disabled young adults in their development into independency by for instance offering them an education into mushroom grower or sheep or rabbit farmer, of course all in cooperation with their relatives and village.

After a long stay in hospital Abass returned to PCC in mid May almost completely paralysed due to a very serious illness.

He had obviously survived it all, however, would he recuperate from the consequences of his disease?

Well, in the mean time we are able to say: marvellously well and much better than we had ever dared to hope. His recuperation has been a long and slow process, but it has been progressive all the time.

He is talking liked he used to (his own and special Abass language!) and he is walking around without help.

Those who have seen him last year after he came home, will not believe their eyes: it's a miracle.

In November 2016 both Stephen and Moses had an orthopaedic operation in Duayaw Nkwanta. Moses was operated on his pes equinus and the position of Stephen's (too much) bended knees was corrected.

Although relatively little time has passed since they got rid of their plaster casts (Stephen since January and Moses only since April) the results seem a great improvement for the both of them. Whether it will be enough and permanent only the future can tell. So far they have been practising often and hard.
