Physiotherapy

Wim is a much appreciated colleague of "our" physio expert Inge Maters and for more than 3 weeks he was "dotting all the PCC physio i's" while observing the progress made by the various children and advising on new exercises to the caregivers and capturing it all on video. He also adjusted many wheelchairs, gave some children fitting orthopaedic shoes and performed many more supporting activities for all children in need.

And he is awfully bucked with a beautiful new keyboard Jeannette had arranged for him (see picture on p. 1). Till (far too) late in the evening we can now hear him practising, all on hearing and feeling, as Kofi Asare does not need sheet music, he just plays any tune he hears, a natural talent!

The 27th July was a very special day for all of us when Father Benneh baptised our 6 newest residents (being: Deborah, Esther, Lizzy, Nana Yaw = Nyamekye, Sara and Solomon) during a beautiful and solemn baptism service in our own wonderful rock church!

For Sara and Solomon – both being autistic – it was rather exciting, for the other children it was mainly a very special and joyful day.



Shortly after this service Father Benneh left Ghana for the USA and we therefore took the opportunity to thank him for his pastoral care during the many moments of joy and sorrow in the past years.

PCC Outreach programma

The PCC Outreach program in the wide Nkoranza District steadily continues. More and more villages are included, especially children with a disability living there with their parents.

We support the parents by organising Parent Support Groups, a kind of "fellow sufferers contact" and we group them together via activities that aim to make the parents and children not only socially stronger, but also economically.

One of the most successful Outreach programs is the Livelihood program, whereby young adult children with a disability, who are well supported by their parents, will receive some animals (e.g. 2 sheep, 2 goats or some rabbits) to offer them their own daily activity that makes them more inclusive in the village community (by making rounds to retrieve cassava peels etc.) and at the same time enabling them to contribute to the family income.
