Dear friends of PCC-Hand in Hand,

The year 2021 is nearing its end and since our latest issue of April last, a lot has happened in our Community. So, high time for this 23rd Newsletter in which we hope to inform you on the ups-and-downs of PCC by telling you stories and offering you pictures to look at. We are very grateful for your unceasing attention for and commitment to the life of the residents here in Nkoranza.

Corona

After our caregivers had recently and rather unexpectedly received their first vaccination against COVID-19 (see the October issue of Albert’s Corner), we were in for a second surprise a few weeks later!

Then a team of the Ministry of Health came to PCC *to immunise all of our residents of 18 and over (a total of 38!!)* here, right on the spot, against COVID-19.

They have all done very well, only a few of our youth had some light post-

vaccination complaints the next day, but these only lasted for a very short time. We are very pleased with this increasingly higher protection against corona infections in PCC!

Daycare Nkoranza

Daycare in Nkoranza has not been functioning for a year yet, since its flying start in January 2021 and it already is a giant success.

Each day about 20 children are coming to this centre although initially we had reckoned with a maximum of 15.

Fortunately, the building has been designed with ample room for a larger number of people. This success is exemplary for the need for complementary care for children with special needs and it is no wonder that parents and children are very happy with this wonderful facility.

Because we have had our own means of transport for a couple of months now – thanks to a generous donation – they feel even happier.



With this so-called:

Okada or Pragya

(in other parts of the world it is often called a Tuk-Tuk) the children are picked up from home in the morning and they are brought back home again in the afternoon. Now, that’s a service!

Daycare Donkro Nkwanta

For a number of years now, we have been running a smaller Daycare in the Nkoranza District, i.e. in the village of Donkro Nkwanta about 15 km away. About 8 children are coming to this centre daily. Outside the village we are busy starting a farm project for a few older youths with special needs.

The building we have used so far for this Daycare will be no longer available to us and we have recently decided to build a Daycare centre of our own.

We are very grateful that we have received a generous donation for the realisation of this project. It is really impressive to have such good friends and loyal supporters.



We hope to be able to use this brand new building in Donkro Nkwanta starting from the end of 2021.

We are much satisfied with the present development of both Daycares. They are, clearly, important facilities for local communities!

We are taking giant strides forward in better care for children with special needs outside the gates of PCC and it makes us proud!

Theresa deceased

We are very sorry for the loss of one of our residents during this past period: Theresa, who lived in PCC for over 13 years, died rather suddenly.

Theresa has always been quite a vulnerable girl and she enjoyed the care in PCC in her own unique way. We sincerely hope that she will now rest in eternal peace.

Because of these changes there is room for some new people and that is why we have recently admitted three young adults to the sheltered workshop for a probation period of three months. They are Emmanuel from Sampa, Nelson from Nkoranza and Elizabeth from Donkro Nkwanta.

We sincerely hope that we will be able to teach them many useful skills in our sheltered workshop.

Fortunately, a few of our much esteemed experts were visiting us in September and October. This made us very happy and grateful after this period of stagnation caused by COVID-19.

One of them was Sue Hatton from Bristol. She has been our expert on autism for years now and she is also the designer of our training programme for caregivers. A true and much respected friend of PCC!
